About Boston Main Streets

Boston Main Streets districts work to provide the tools and support necessary to create, build, and sustain viable commercial districts throughout Boston. From new storefront designs and innovative marketing, to creative events that drive foot traffic and create a sense of community, Boston Main Streets districts are not only helping businesses grow—they attract new businesses and residents to their area.

The Main Streets program is successful because of the hands-on involvement of volunteers from the neighborhood. Groups such as merchants associations, property owners, banks, schools, churches, community development organizations, and others combine their respective insights, skills, and energies to strengthen the commercial district and build collaborative partnerships.

The Main Street Approach is centered on Transformation Strategies. A Transformation Strategy articulates a focused, deliberate path to revitalizing or strengthening a downtown or commercial district's economy. A program's work on Transformation Strategies should be organized around the Four Points: Economic Vitality, Design, Promotion, and Organization.


